SPECIAL FRIENDS TEAM REPORT March 9, 2004 Meeting

Our opening worship centered on the "Prayer of St. Francis" (No. 481 in our hymnal) attributed to St. Francis of Assisi, 1181-1226, but not known in print until 1913: "Lord, Make me an instrument of your peace...". We sang John Wesley's "Rule of Life" Do all the good you can...".

coach's corner

We are the pioneer church of Clovis rooted in the positive message and mission of Christ whose purpose is to demonstrate God's love in a spirit of acceptance.

Your Horizon Vision Leadership Team has been working for two years to create an intentional process for growing disciples. The team has looked at other church's efforts and reflected on our own vision and mission for a lay lead ministry in which we all seek to live out the love of God in the spirit of the grace of Jesus Christ.

Here is an overview of the process proposed for acceptance by church council. A complete copy is on the counter in the office or you may call the church and have one mailed to you. Growing as Disciples of Christ at Memorial UMC A Five Stage Process for Nurturing Faithful Discipleship:

Stage 1: Coming to Faith

FOCUS: The journey of faith and the transformed life.

Scripture: Ephesians 3: 16-19.

Life Questions: "Do I want to be a Christian?" "What needs do I bring with me which faith and the church can address?

Primary Subject Matter: Who is Jesus Christ?

One Learning Objective: Personally wrestle with who Jesus is.

- First Covenant of Commitment: Attend worship faithfully and give financially.
- Stage 2: Connecting to the Church (Also transfer members entry point.)
- FOCUS: What it means to be part of the Body of Christ.

Scripture: I Corinthians 12

- Life Questions: "How does my faith fit/connect with the church as I am coming to understand it?"
- Primary Subject Matter: The vision, mission, core values, structure, history of MUMC and expectations for membership.
- One Learning Objective: Know and affirm the vision and mission of MUMC.
- Second Covenant of Commitment: Support the vision, mission and core values of MUMC.

Stage 3: Practicing My Faith

- FOCUS: Growing in spirit and faith as a disciple.
- Scripture: Ephesians 4:13
- Life Question: "What does it mean to walk with Jesus?"
- Primary Subject Matter: Spiritual formation and understanding worship.

Two Learning Objectives: Develop a devotional life. Participate in a growth in faith opportunity such as Disciple Bible.

Third Covenant of Commitment: Commit to practicing spiritual disciplines.

Fourth Covenant of Commitment: Commit to growing in faith.

Stage 4: Ministry and Mission

FOCUS: Discovering my gifts, passion and call to ministry.

Scripture: Ephesians 4:12

Life Question: "What is God's call for me?"

Primary Subject Matter: Discerning my gifts and graces and call to ministry.

One Learning Objective: Connect with a ministry of choice or initiate a ministry of choice in keeping with the vision and mission of MUMC.

Fifth Covenant of Commitment: Answer God's call to active ministry.

Only a small percentage of people will be interested in pursuing the final stage of this process according to their gifts, graces and God's call in their life:

Stage Five: Sustaining Visioning Leadership FOCUS: Apostleship. Scripture: Ephesians 4:1a.

Life Question: "What is God calling me to do as a leader to grow the Church of Jesus Christ that will transform lives and the world through the gospel of Jesus Christ?

Primary Subject Matter: Sustaining and visionary leadership for ministry and mission to the world. Two Learning Objectives: Discern God's call for sustaining/visioning leadership and mentor and lead leaders in ministry and mission. Sixth Covenant of Commitment: Life-long maturity in spiritual growth and discipleship as a Listening, Learning, Spiritual Teacher and Leader."

This proposal will be voted on by Council on April 14. Your comments and questions are welcome. Contact myself or Council chair Sharon Hutchinson or a member of the Horizon Team.

The Five Fingers of Prayer



1. Your thumb is nearest to you. So begin your prayers by praying for those closest to you. They are the easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is, as C. S. Lewis once said, a "sweet duty."

2. The next finger is the pointing finger. Pray for those who teach, instruct and heal. This includes teachers, doctors, and ministers. They need support and wisdom in pointing others in the right direction. Keep them in your prayers.

3. The next finger is the tallest finger. It reminds us of our leaders. Pray for the president, leaders in business and industry, and administrators. These people shape our nation and guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.

4 The fourth finger is our ring finger. Surprising to many is the fact that this is our weakest finger; as any piano teacher will testify. It should remind us to pray for those who are weak, in trouble or in pain. They need your prayers day and night. You cannot pray too much for them.

5. And lastly comes our little finger; the smallest finger of all, which is where we should place ourselves in relation to God and others. As the Bible says, "The least shall be the greatest among you." Your pinkie should remind you to pray for yourself. By the time you have prayed for the other four groups, your own needs will be put into proper perspective and you will be able to pray for yourself more effectively. Should you find it hard to get to sleep tonight, just remember the homeless family who has no bed to lie in.
