### CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICES FOR DECEMBER 24




### Worship Ministry

## DID YOU KNOW...? OUR COFFEE HOUR IS "FAIR TRADE"

Did you know that our fellowship time after worship features Fair Trade coffee and tea? Coffee is the second largest U.S. import after oil and we are the largest consumer of the beverage in the world. Few Americans know that many small coffee farmers are paid an amount for the beans they toil so hard to grow that is less than the cost of production. Many of these farmers are forced into a cycle of poverty and debt.

For a coffee or tea importer to become Fair Trade certified, they must meet certain criteria. These include agreeing to pay a fair minimum price to the grower for beans or leaves, encouraging and helping to provide healthy and safe working conditions for laborers, assuring that child labor laws are not being abused, buying from producers who engage in environmentally sustainable practices, etc. By purchasing Fair Trade Certified products, we show our support for an equitable partnership between marketers in North America and growers in Latin America, Asia, Africa, and the Caribbean.

Your contribution to the basket on the Coffee Hour table helps support our effort to extend our faith walk into the world. We now have Fair Trade coffee and tea products available to purchase for home use or gift giving. The small profit we will make off of these products will go to an Advance Special mission project. We got these items from the Equal Exchange United Methodist Committee on Relief Coffee Project.

#### **CROP WALK TREMENDOUS SUCCESS!!**

What a fantastic day we had here in Clovis on October 24th when we hosted the CROP Walk for the Hungry. On that day approximately 400 walkers from 36 different faith walks and organizations came together and raised over \$28,000 (a new record for the Fresno area Walk!) for those in need in our community and the world. This was an increase of over 200 walkers and \$10,000 in giving from last year's walk. Our walkers from MUMC raised nearly \$2,000 which more than doubled our total from last year. The weather was cool, but the spirit of cooperation and brotherhood warmed our hearts as we walked to raise money and awareness about the tragedy of hunger.

What a tremendous effort was put forth by so many from our church to make all these people feel welcome. Just some of those special people: Pauline Middleton, Pat McGinnis, Judy Gross-registration, Howard and Mary Vollman and Don and Evelyn Haulman-welcome and water tables, Ron and the entire Zastovnik family-sound, Denice Leslie-words of welcome and general, all-around encouragement, Laura Williams-after the walk cleanup, Roger Grams-snacks, Mariama Mathai-recruitment, Connie Alfaro and our wonderful Youth Groupanything I asked them to do, walkers, sponsors, and all of you in our congregation who so graciously put up with the inconvenience of 400 people descending on our church on a Sunday afternoon. Many of our guest walkers let us know how much they enjoyed the route in Clovis and the warm welcome they received from our church and from the people of Clovis. Thank you all so much!!

#### WHERE YOUR DONATIONS HAVE GONE

Two years ago we had a fundraising drive for new computer equipment for the church. Your donations for that cause have gone a long way and are still going! The major purchase with your donations was a server. All of the church's data is safely stored on the server and can be accessed from any computer in the office. Security is enhanced with the server since it controls all logons to all church computers. With the remote access capability of the server, our church secretary, Cheryl, has the capability of working from home when necessary and she has done that. Your donations purchased two computers both now being used heavily by Contributions Secretary Diane and volunteer helpers. We were also able to get high speed DSL internet service which has been a critical benefit for keeping computers updated and for email and web access. We still have two more computers due for replacement which will happen soon. More donations for those are not necessary! You did it two years ago and the funds were managed so there would be enough for these two computers. There is enough! Thank you for your donations two years ago for this project!

#### PASTOR'S FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP REPORT

One of the core values of this congregation is giving. As we conclude our 2004 financial stewardship drive I am once again humbled by your stewardship. It reflects your growth in faith.

Although pledges are still outstanding, as of November 22, 2004 the total pledged for 2005 is 166,482. This includes a designated pledge of 3560. Last year's pledged amount was 158,444 with a designated pledge of 3160 for apportionment giving and 1,680 for Hmong Mission.

I also want to lift up the Boutique group and the Mission Thrift Shop for their financial stewardship. Each group makes substantial contributions to our general fund making it possible for us to fulfill at least some of our apportionment responsibilities for world service, pension and other apportioned or district asking mission line items. For example, the recent Boutique has raised over 5,000.

We are blessed. Thanks to our giving we will continue to grow in faith, share the gospel, and serve Jesus Christ.

This is such a lovely time of year! The last of the fall leaves are falling; the cold weather has settled in and the mountains are covered with snow. Christmas lights brighten neighborhood homes in the early darkness. Inside we are preparing for Christmas. Trees, greens and decorations are going up and Santas everywhere are hiding packages around the house.

Of course there is the usual frazzle that comes with the dazzle! Give your family and yourself some spiritual nourishment by carving out a time once a week between now and Christmas to remember why we celebrate. Find four candles and make an advent wreath. If you want to distinguish between the Christmas season and Advent then

choose three purple and one rose candle or four deep blue candles for your wreath. Then pick up an Advent home worship folders available in the lobby of the church for inspiration and reflection. Or pick up a copy of the November/December Alive Now: the focus is Advent and Christmas.

Advent is the first season of the new Christian Year. Since the Christian Year follows Jesus life and ministry, Advent is the "pregnant" season when we prepare for God's coming to us in the Christ child. The purple color reminds us of royalty and also of our need to take stock of our lives permitting us time to "clean our spiritual house." The pink candle of course reminds us of the joy of the season as we anticipate Christ's birth. Advent blue is a lovely color we also associate with Jesus' mother Mary and the solemnity and joy of the season.

Kids usually are fascinated with candlelight and love to light candles! And there is something about candlelight's soft glow that brings out the glow in we adults as well. And candle flame reminds us: Christ is the light of the world. A light no darkness can overcome. Let us be His light!

As we prepare our homes and hearts to receive the Prince of Peace let us not become so self-preoccupied that we forget the reason the world needs a Savior. This year in particular, let us remember the ravages of war around the world but most especially in Iraq. Children are suffering in unimaginable ways in Iraq after already bearing the brunt of the sanctions during Saddam's reign for lack of medical care and basic nutrition. Millions of children have died.

Family life is anything but stable in that country right now with no work, no working infrastructure and the increasing violence and destruction of homes and major cities. The majority of the population does not have enough to eat and must drink dirty water.

It is time for us to set aside our political ideologies and as Christians remind the world that we serve the Prince of Peace and work to do all we can to encourage an end of the conflict and the rebuilding of the country and its society. This is a faith issue--not just a political issue.

The best of all is that God, our Emmanuel, is with us! Let us serve him on behalf of the world he came to save.
