MUMC COUNCIL MEETING MARCH 11, 2004

Attendance: Sharon Hutchinson, Denice Leslie, Laurence Hill, Jean Hill, Joan Bowser, Rick Hutchinson, Betty Gist, Dee Carr, Roger Grams, Barbara Grams, Barbara Nielsen, Minnie Eller, Sue DeFranco, Gloria McClanahan, Connie Alfaro, Diane Zastovnik, Ben Zastovnik, Louise Smith. Meeting called to order by Sharon Hutchinson at 7:00 p.m.

Correction of Minutes: Copy of list of projects will be provided and distributed at next council meeting instead of being attached to February minutes.

Minutes approved as corrected. After joys and concerns were shared, Denice lead us in prayer. Stewardship report: Rick Hutchinson reported the lunch on February 29 was a success. Donations covered the cost of the lunch and Mark Parsons will return at a later time.

Finance report: Diane Zastovnik reported financial situation appears quite well without report of payables, which Georgia usually reports. \$36,000 was received in February of which a large portion is for the endowment fund. January was ok.

Campaign for funds: This Sunday and for the next three weeks boards will be posted in the narthex soliciting funds for worship, music, children's education, office expenses, and trustees fund.

Trustees' report: Church Security: Sharon read Mac Magargee's form that leadership will fill out designating responsibility for locked doors and turning off heating/air conditioning

and lights at the end of meetings and events in the church buildings. There will be an announcement of security procedures in the church newsletter. Betty Gist is creating a work order form for repair requests.

Missions committee: Laurie reports he and Jean will go on another UMCOR workshop at the Midwestern distribution center in Illinois this year. He showed materials about Abraham given by the Middletons to be contributed to the library. It was suggested that a subject file be set up in the library. Laurie also showed us cards available in narthex for bringing students to the Fresno Symphony

Welcome ministry. Laurie explained a need for trained persons to reach out to visitors making them comfortable and answering questions. This team of "spotters" would provide follow up also. This function is in addition to the PIE procedure. A Motion_was made, second and carried to create such a team. Laurie will start the committee and release it for maintenance by someone else.

Laurie also reports that Special Friends Committee is developing a **care card** for members in need, which will include whom to contact Privacy requirements were discussed.

Hearing Aids were purchased with the \$600 grant from UMW sources. They need to be assembled. Ben Zastovnik presented his Eagle Scout project of beautification of our grounds. Motion made, seconded and carried that Ben proceed with the project. He will make a presentation next Sunday in church.

Crop walk will be hosted by our church on October 24 starting at 2:30. Walks will be 1 ½ to 3 miles reports Sue DeFranco. There will be an organizational meeting on Sunday April 18 at 3:00 p.m.

Mission Thrift Shop: beginning in April the Mission Thrift Shop will be open every Saturday from 9 to 1.

Boutique group submitted **bylaws** and they include the fact that funds are for World Services of the Conference except for a portion of the funds for special projects.

Christian education: Barbara Grams reported "Surprise Sunday" activities, which will

encourage attendance. The All Star program is very successful. In March, Wayne Golden who played the sousaphone and accordion in his youth will present the program.

Worship: Barbara grams reports fine tuning and planning of Easter services are coming along. March 20 from 9 to 12:00 is the next Worship Committee meeting.

Hmong Ministry: Three grants from the conference have been awarded to our church and will go towards the \$12,500 for Kham Dy's salary. The Hmong worship service attendance has doubled in size. They are participating in "Holy Thursday" every Thursday by joining the potluck group and having study groups afterwards. This Sunday the Hmong are inviting all to a 3:30 feast.

Youth Report by Connie Alfaro reports a snow trip on March 19-21 at Hutchinson cabin; March 28 Bunco Party with Wesley Youth invited; Heifer project festival in April and Leonard Sweet day long and night lecture on April 22 sponsored by Fresno Pacific Horizon Team by Barbara Grams described stages of growing as disciples: a series of in depth study groups to be offered members from the unchurched to more mature Christians. The calendar was reviewed regarding the Easter season. The Easter letter will be forthcoming with information about the Easter offering. Council of Ministries will meet on March 18 in the morning.

died in 1226. It turns out that the prayer parallels several writings of Francis and was pictured in 1916 with him holding it in his hand, as a prayer for peace in the midst of World War I. We sang Francis' hymn (#62 in our hymnal) "All Creatures of our God and King."

A couple of weeks ago, I was asked this question and I immediately answered "Sunday!" I look forward to Sundays, a time set aside to worship God, as a Christian, with other Christians. I was recently given the opportunity to spend two of my favorite days out of our country.

On February 1st, the first Sunday of February, I was at Memorial with you, received Holy Communion, and also a prayer for healing, as I had fears of being so far away from loved ones and all that was familiar. With a blessing that the Holy Trinity would be with me, protecting, directing, and strengthening, and the assurance that I was held in the prayers of many, I left for India with my husband, Kumar, on February 3rd. The purpose of our trip was to visit his elderly parents in Chennai (Madras), South India.

My first Sunday away, the second Sunday in February, was in Chennai and I decided to attend a service at St. Andrew's Church, historically Presbyterian, built in 1821 during the time of British rule in India. It is a lovely church, classic in architectural style, with a high domed ceiling of dark blue with "stars" arranged as in the constellations seen in Scotland. When the early Scottish worshippers knelt in prayer, they could look up and think of Scotland! Except for that, the church seemed

very Indian - wicker-backed pews, ceiling fans, tiled marble floors, huge open windows letting in the gentle breeze, sight of lush green vegetation, and the smell of tropical flowers. The congregation was primarily Indian with a smattering of Caucasians. I was surrounded by Indian ladies dressed in colorful saris and salwar kameezs. My sister-in-law, Prema, although a Hindu, willingly attended the service with me.

I had to concentrate intently as the Rev. T. Devaputhiran spoke to us in English, with a strong Indian accent and then the pulpit guest, Rev. Joe Goodridge, gave a wonderful sermon in English with a Scottish accent! I felt so much at home - two of the four hymns we sung were by Charles Wesley. Everyone was so friendly and after the service I had a chance to talk to one of the members. She told me about their service to God through providing day care and lunches for the young children living in nearby slums.

The next day turned out to be very special, also. Not many people know that the disciple of Jesus, St. Thomas, took Christ's message of love and salvation to India. He preached and taught throughout South India for twenty years, before being killed, by unbelievers, on a hilltop in Chennai around 72 A.D. I was able to visit this site and pray in a little chapel erected by the Portuguese in 1523. Many shrines and churches have been on this site over the ages. Again I saw Christians hard at work. They were re-bricking a stairway leading from the parking up to the church. lot

My third Sunday of February began in Singapore, which has primarily a Chinese population. We had left Chennai at 11:30 pm and landed in Singapore at 6:30 a.m. After getting to the hotel and having breakfast and a shower, it was time for me to find a church. I

asked to concierge if there was a church close by. When he suggested a Catholic Church, I hesitated and said, "well . . ." Then he said, "how about Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints?" I said "no . . ., do you have a Methodist church listed?" He asked me to wait for a moment and he disappeared behind a door. Coming back with a big smile, he said, "I have found just the right church. There is a big celebration today at Wesley Methodist Church." My response was an emphatic, "yes!"

What a marvelous experience the worship was at this church. They were celebrating the 119th year church anniversary with a congregation of over 6,000 - six pastors and a large full time church staff. They have eight Sunday services in English, half traditional and half prayer & praise, one Filipino service, three Korean services, and one Mandarin service. What energy and power flows from the Holy Spirit to our Singaporean Methodist brothers and sisters. It was amazing and thrilling to worship with them. Again, I was part of the tiny minority of Caucasians, surrounded, this time, by mainly Chinese followers of our Lord Jesus. A woman sitting next to me asked me if I would like to be on the altar flower committee. I laughed and told her I would love to be, but that I lived in California! As this was such a special Sunday, again I was privileged to hear a pulpit guest, the Rev. Dr. Issac Lim, who is President of the Trinity Annual Conference, The Methodist Church in Singapore. In the bulletin, there was a quote by him which I really liked.

We are global citizens. As God blesses us, it is our responsibility to bless Methodism globally as well. Let us emulate the Spirit of John Wesley and consider the world as our parish . . . let us seek the presence of God so that as a people called Methodists, we will be

key in community, national, and global transformation to the glory of God. By the fourth Sunday of February, I was back in Clovis, having had a perfect trip, and was worshipping with you, at Memorial. My first prayer was to thank God, once again, for my favorite day!
