Good News, March 2005

Think About It by Gloria McClanahan

After leaving my part-time job at 12 p.m., I had to return to work at 3:00 p.m. to listen to a presentation to teachers and staff at Roosevelt High. We had settled in the auditorium and waited and waited and at 3:20 a very obese, non-professional, not young, rumpled gentleman was introduced as our speaker. All I could think was, "Why are we here, just look at him."

He sat down, get this, sat down with a three legged table balanced on his knees (one of the legs was missing or shorter). I was sighing and waiting with one of those awful disapproving looks on my face, I'm sure. He began his speech with "My name is David Hinsburger, I have been fat all my life and I know what it is like to be gazed upon in disgust." His subject was "Bullying" and Sexual Victimization of People With Developmental Disabilities.

Mr. Hinsburger's message described the inherently hostile world which greets special needs students every day of their lives. He described a study where hundreds of persons with special needs were sent into the public with the assignment of describing what happened to them within the first fifteen minutes. 100% reported that something nasty happened to them. "Nasty" included rude stares, thoughtless and rude comments, pushing, shoving, pinching, harassment and even violence.

Mr. Hinsburger gave us guidelines of how to respond to persons with a complaint bearing in mind how much courage it takes to reach out for help. He said everyone including teachers and parents almost always say, "Just ignore it," which response really doesn't help. He suggests teaching the person to say in their head "I don't care what mean people think" and to recite that to themselves when being taunted or treated impolitely.

In conversing with the victim who comes to us with a complaint, he offers the following five steps to take: 1. Answer with the truth, "That must hurt," which acknowledges it; 2. Then ask "What do you think of those people? 3. Then ask, "Do you think this just happens to you or everyone? This question takes away the loneliness; 4. Point out that aggressors are mean and remind them to tell themselves "I don't care what mean people think." And 5. Let them know they are welcome to come back if there is anything else to tell.

Of course, take action on their behalf!! There were a lot of statistics and situations described by Mr. Hinsburger, but I wanted to share the part of this presentation that sensitizes us to be better companions and caregivers to God's special people who really need our friendliness and kind gestures.

CROP Walk 2004

It is a pleasure to announce that the final total collected for the Fresno-Clovis Community CROP Walk for the Hungry was over \$29,000 with 400+ walkers from diverse faiths and organizations participating. The 2004 Walk was the most successful in the local Walk's 21 year history in terms of amount collected and number of walkers! Our church more than doubled the amount we raised over last year, collecting a total of \$2017! What a blessing it was to be the host church for this unforgettable event which helped to raise awareness about global and local hunger issues. It was a joy to walk through the town of Clovis which went out of its way to make our guest walkers feel welcome. Thanks again to all of you who helped in any way to make the day such a success. Don't put your walking shoes too far back in the closet-the CROP organizing committee is already making plans for the 2005 Walk which will be hosted by Westside Church of God.

Fair Trade Coffee

Thank you for your support of our Fair Trade Coffee Hour and coffee sales over the past few months. By purchasing and promoting fairly traded products we have helped small scale farmers in Latin America, Africa, and Asia earn a fairer share of income, obtain access to credit and technical support, and gain a trading partner they can trust, a fair trade organization called *Equal Exchange*.

Your contributions to the basket on the fellowship table or your purchases of the Fair Trade coffee we have been selling will also allow us to give to an Advance Special project of the United Methodist Church. 100% of funds collected for an Advance project go directly to the project! A suggested donation of \$6 per bag purchased will cover our cost for the coffee and provide a profit of about \$1 that will go directly to our Advance project. If you choose to give more, any amount over the cost of the coffee will benefit that cause as well. Because our first shipment of

coffee was paid for by a donation from a church member, our first gift to our project will be \$84.

In the wake of the December 26th tsunami, farmers in Indonesia who supply coffee to *Equal Exchange* have had their land, their crops, and their lives devastated. Your support of our 2005 Coffee Project will help them regroup and rebuild. A new shipment of Fair Trade coffee will arrive soon with French Vanilla, Columbian Decaf, Organic Breakfast Blend, and Organic Mind, Body and Soul Blend available for purchase.

One Great Hour of Sharing-March 6th

Each year United Methodists worldwide join together on the fourth Sunday in Lent to celebrate and support a very special ministry through the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. On behalf of The United Methodist Church, UMCOR (the United Methodist Committee on Relief) brings relief when a catastrophe strikes. UMCOR representatives rush to disaster areas all over the world to provide food, clothing, shelter, and medical help and then stay to assist survivors with rebuilding their lives. From reeducating soldiers to feeding school children to establishing medical clinics in remote villages, UMCOR is hope for millions in nearly 100 of the poorest countries in the world. This past year UMCOR rushed to the scene of so many tragedies-flood and hurricane damage in the United States, aid for victims of civil war and unrest in the Sudan, and comfort to those in South Asia devastated by a massive earthquake and the resulting tsunami to name a

Most contributions to UMCOR are designated for specific programs— and those programs receive 100 percent of those gifts. So part of the *One Great Hour of Sharing* offering plus a small percentage of other general donations support UMCOR's administrative costs. The Easter or Paschal Candle

The Paschal candle is the most traditional, and the largest, of all the candles used in Christian worship. It is a tall decorative candle, held in a floor stand, which symbolizes Christ's appearances after his resurrection. A new Paschal candle is lit at the Easter Vigil, on Easter Eve, or at the first service on Easter morning, and it stands close to the Lord's Table. After Easter Sunday, it is then lit every Sunday throughout the Great Fifty Days between Easter and Pentecost. During the rest of the year, the Paschal candle is place by the baptismal font and is lit at baptism, which the ancient church called "enlightenment." It may also be lit at funerals and memorial services, symbolizing Christ's leading the baptized through the exodus of death.

The Paschal candle may be very plain or extremely ornate, often having the design of a cross, the Greek letters alpha and omega, and numerals of the current year embossed or inscribed on it. The height of the candle varies, but most are 25-36 inches tall with the stand being around three feet fall. An interesting historical note is that in Medieval England in Durham, the Paschal candle with stand was a total of seventy feet high and had to be lit from above!

Coach's Corner

This month I want to lift up some special facilities needs for you to be aware of and bring you an update on our Hmong Outreach Ministry.

Projects:

I am so excited by a proposed master plan for relandscaping our facility presented to the Board of Trustees by landscaper Karen Faulkner and the Renovation Committee. The first phase has been approved by Trustees and has been planted! Drive by the front of the church and you will be delighted! You will be hearing more about this and have an opportunity to participate with your donations as things unfold. This will not be an immediate huge financial outlay thanks to the consideration given as to how plantings will go in over time and future planting seasons. Watch for more information.

As you know we are having increasing difficulty with our sound system. Ron Zastovnik presented a Sound Improvement plan to the Council which was adopted and reported in detail in a previous Good News. What we need now is funding. The first phase of the improvement was funded by last year's concert in cooperation with Jenny Meyer's Vocal Studio. Although it is now easier to hear me preach thanks to the new wrap around cordless microphone and new mike receiver, because the speakers are blown the ability to understand what is spoken is greatly diminished. One of these Sundays they are not going to work. It is a constant battle during Sunday worship and so disruptive to have the sound act up. This next phase is substantial in scope and requires a little over \$6,000. Donations will be gratefully accepted! Mark your donation Sound System.

Finally the sanctuary floor, choir rail and backwall renovation (not to mention the organ chambers) all need addressing. A proposal is in the works for a project to meet these needs with the possibility of funding them over a longer period of time.

Hmong Ministry

As for our Hmong Outreach Ministry, there are now 160 people involved in the Hmong Language Ministry thanks to the tireless work of Pastor Kham Dy Yang. Pastor Yang has not been as visible as he would like to be with us due to the on-going chartering authority and funding crisis with the HART Academy of which he is the Executive Director. This crisis resulted in a terribly precarious financial situation for Kham Dy and his family as well as for the school, ate up mountains of time and the

resulting stress has had an adverse affect on Kham Dy's

You may not be aware that we fund only \$17,000 of Kham Dy's support which, after deducting for professional expenses results in about a quarter time salary. This money has been fully funded from grants from our denomination through the present. The school has been his family's primary means of support.

I firmly believe Providence had a hand in the salvation of the school and the Yangs and as a result of the future of our Hmong Language Ministry. The Kingsburg Elementary Community Charter School district stepped in at the very last minute (literally)—as the school was set to close its final day-- and expressed an interest in taking on the school. The result is the Academy is now on firm financial footing, there will be no delay in paying salaries, all the financial administrative tasks will be provided by them, all curriculum is fully provided, and they will partner with the school when and if they decide to charter in the vears ahead. In addition to that the board members of the KECC and Dr. Mark Ford are Christians and resonate to the evangelistic work we are doing here at Memorial permitting Kham Dy to continue in his work here (which is separate from the school—the school is a public school).

Because this ongoing crisis, spanning the last nine months with a "save" by the newly chartered Valley Prepatory School which carried the Academy from September until January 15 on skeletal pay --when they were able to pay the staff. As a consequence, much of the development work we had been doing with the Hmong members and the larger congregation was stalled. Things are gradually righting themselves, and we covet your prayers!

This has truly been a resurrection experience for all of us involved! God is faithful and we are surprised by joy! May the Living Christ keep you young at heart, ready and willing to risk for the sake of the good news and open to the work of the Holy Spirit!

YANGS NEED FINANCIAL SPONSORS FOR CITIZENSHIP

The majority of the 1.5 generation of Hmong refugees who have come to the United States are in need of citizenship. Most of these folks now in their 20'sand 30's were born in the camps in Thailand and educated here in the United States. The fees required are a major hurdle to gaining citizenship. Pastor Kham Dy Yang and Melody want to apply for citizenship and have not been able to afford to do so. The fees needed are approximately \$500 each.
