The choir is always welcoming new voices. All who would like to sing are invited to join us in rehearsals on Thursdays at 7:30 p.m.



TOM BANDY WORKSHOP

The District-wide workshop featuring Tom Bandy was an overwhelming success. There were initially 156 signed up so we set up for 175. The final count was well over 200. Although the presentation by Tom was well received, there were areas of concern raised by participants. If you weren't there, it might be difficult to understand but I'll attempt to simplify it. Tom spoke to the necessity of embedding a new methodology that would change the way in which members recognized, approached, and implemented ministries they might feel called to. Another area had to do with committees.

Since I had the task of chauffeuring Tom while he was here, I was afforded the unique opportunity to question him, at some length, regarding these concerns. It appears these are areas that consistently need further addressing. Whenever he is asked to return to put on another workshop, these are the ones most requested. Part of the confusion was due to the condensed nature of the presentation. This discouraged in-depth discussions although I personally thought Tom's responses to questions pertaining to these areas made it clear for me.

The methodology he was advocating was one in which ministries were generated and implemented at the lay level by individuals or groups and not directed by clergy or committees. In order to insure integrity and accountability, a lengthy process of instructing and equipping is required. This process can take up to a year or more and, as Tom stated in one of his examples, in some cases, it might never happen. Once in place, the process becomes an integral part of the assimilation of new members. Members then have a full understanding of the guidelines and structure in which they are required to operate in any ministry they should choose to accept as their calling.

As for the committees, some thought he was advocating the death of all committees. In

reality, he was offering a change in the way we identify the need for a committee and the way in which it is staffed. In simplest form, only those who saw it as a calling would be involved. Committees would function as teams who actually do ministry rather than supervise or There would be no manage ministry. nominations and/or coercion. If a committee didn't get a sufficient response, then it would be allowed to die. This same criterion would be applied to any ministries that were having difficulty staying afloat. Part of apprehension this caused may have come from our current experiences. We know how painful and difficult it can be to find people willing to become involved whether it be administrative committees or ministries.

However, we need to revisit the very essence of the process he's advocating. The embedding of a new sense of why we are followers of Christ and how that is reflected in the way we conduct our lives not only in the church but also in the community. Only when there has been an awakening of, and a rededication to, our evangelical responsibilities as Christians will the concepts that were offered at the workshop have any possibility of success.

When I shared Jean's story with Diane Zastovnik, guess what! Yes, Diane shared with me her heartburst for mission came to her as a young college student: to serve American Indians through the VISTA program. She had completed the 33-page application when along came Ron and she too has served in mission through her local church-- today with the Hmong community!

Listen to your HEARTBURSTS! They are the heartbeat of Jesus in you!

A LETTER FROM PASTOR KNUDSON

To the members of my church family:

Eleanor and I blew our entertainment budget to see and hear Andrea Bocelli. I could write paragraphs about his magnificent voice, the beautiful tones of Maria Martinez, and the glorious accompaniment of the Fresno Philharmonic. However, the news media have already done that. The setting was reasonably comfortable – I didn't think I could sit still for two hours, but I did. From any place in the arena, one could see clearly (though distantly) what was happening on stage.

Most of all, I marveled at the sound system. The music was clear, static free, with full range of tone and volume. It surrounded and enveloped the audience and literally took possession of one's soul. Somewhere, a camera caught the images of the performers (including flautist Janette Erickson, a member of our church) and projected them on a screen at the rear of the stage. I noted that no performer had to turn on his or her microphone, not did anyone on the stage have to ask, "Am I coming through." Everything in the sound system seemed to function perfectly.

A few days later, I attended worship in my church. We are bedeviled by a sound system straight out of the 19th century, microphones that are not always reliable, a projection system that works, thanks to those who operate it, but with drawbacks.

The point I would make is that people, especially of younger generations, are used to going to events that employ top-grade, state-ofthe-art equipment. Coming to church, they note the contrast and wonder if maybe the message we preach and the values we profess are as antiquated as the equipment we use to put them across. I have no wish to see the worship of God become an entertainment event. Our church is not competing with Save mart Arena. I would not want to replace our choir with a chorus if Italian tenors nor our organ and organist with the Fresno Philharmonic and its conductor. But surely, what's good enough for Bocelli and Elton John out to be good enough for God.

I appreciate our sound technicians and projectionists, who do well with the equipment they have. I would simply like to see the tolls bought, paid for, installed, and put in their hands, in order to make God's message come through loud and clear. Surely, in our effort to make the bread of life available God deserves the best we can offer.
