Mirror Mirror

Most of us have looked in the mirror at one time or another, asking the familiar fairy-tale question, Mirror, Mirror on the wall if not our loud but in our mind.

The strange thing about mirrors is they never lie. What you see is everyone sees, at least physically. And sometimes, all our best effort to accentuate the positive And downplay the negative still leaves us discontented with our looks.

Finance Report

Income in January and February did not cover the bills for those two months. This is because we have major payments in January for insurance. The property insurance bill was \$10,814 for the year and the health insurance premium for the first quarter was \$7,323. This shortfall is an annual occurrence. The carryover from previous years helps with this, but often is not enough to keep from coming out behind early in the year.

The General Fund expenses for the two months totaled \$58,181. Total income was \$36,563. We were able to make the insurance payments and all other expenses excluding apportionments by using the \$632 carried over from 2017 and borrowing from our designated funds. At the end of February, the General Fund was short by \$21,869 which will need to be made up as the months go by. Extra contributions early in the year will help with this cash flow situation and plans are being discussed to attempt to increase giving.

The Thrift Store raised enough to contribute \$3,200 for the Conference Tithe (apportionments). This payment toward the \$4,380 due for January and February was made at the end of March.

A major expense in March was the annual payment to Workman's Compensation Insurance which totaled \$2,135. And in April we will need to pay the second quarter health insurance premium of \$7,323.

Thank you to everyone who continues to contribute generously to make our ministries possible.

Our estimates of giving totaling \$149,099 are up from last year. Because cash flow is so tight at the start of the year we encourage people to be diligent in supporting the church at this time of the year.

As a church, we have many wonderful ministries that we are able to carry out, and many more that we carry in our hearts until we find a way to make them happen. We pray that each person associated with our church will find ways to help further God's kingdom



The Church Council meeting in February was our first test of our new format emphasizing training up ministry leaders and expanding the mission of the congregation. To this end, we spend about an hour on discipleship and leadership strengthening, and about 40 minutes on business and administration items.

We are excited to report that there are many mission and ministry opportunities coming our way in the months ahead:

We are planning "block parties" to get to know our neighbors betters. We will need LOTS of help for this to be a successful outreach.

We are instrumental in getting a computer lab established in the United Methodist University in Liberia! Our next project in support of this outreach ministry will focus on equipping the UM schools that train up students to attend the University. Half of our Easter offering will go toward this ministry.

We are pleased to support Jeremiah Yang's trip to Greece to work with Syrian refugees. We are planning to have Jeremiah present in worship later in the summer to share about his experiences.

There will be a one-day event for women on aging. It is designed to be a fun day of celebration. This will happen on April 21.

MUMC is being invited to play a role in the revitalization efforts for the congregation at Calwa. Our role is not yet fully refined, but it is likely we will have the opportunity to work with a person who has training in new ways to be in ministry. This will be helpful not only to the Calwa neighborhood, but to us as well! Half of the Easter offering will go towards this ministry.

We will have fun together with the other churches of the circuit at the Grizzlies game on June 9. We will raise funds and awareness for Imagine No Malaria through this event.

The Church Council meets on the fourth Sunday of each month. Anyone may attend the meetings. They start at 12:45 pm in the library, (after we have birthday cake in the Fellowship Hall). The meetings are chaired by our Lay Leader, Jamie Belt.

Living in resurrection time. What does that mean to us? How does a people live into that promise which is already fulfilled?

I am reading a book entitled <u>Canoeing the Mountains</u>, by Tod Bolsinger. The author uses inspiration and wisdom gained from the Lewis & Clark expedition as a way of looking at how congregations and congregational leadership must change in these times.

One interesting concept explored is the reality of how much we humans resist change.

Even when faced with the very real possibility of death, people most often do not change. Changing eating habits, or quitting smoking, increasing exercise, or reducing stress — all of these are proven to increase health and vitality. Yet when individuals are faced with the reality that if they don't make changes in these areas they will hasten death, most do not successfully make lifestyle adjustment.

In the US today Christianity is waning. This is not true world wide. It is true here in the US. Research is showing that the model of a church providing programs for the members is no longer sustaining vital ministry in most communities. We can take that information seriously and make changes in the "lifestyle" of the congregation. Or we can go along as we have been, and hope we are not another casualty of changing times. We can make the changes needed to thrive — to the glory of God — in the world in which we find ourselves, or we can be like MANY congregations and dwindle until we eventually close the doors permanently. It won't happen quickly, but it will happen IF we don't make conscious decisions to change our way of "being church" and "doing church."

That is shocking to consider.

FORTUNATELY, there is GOOD NEWS!

The Bible accounts of Jesus' resurrection indicate that he was significantly changed when he came out of the tomb. His closest friends didn't recognize him at first. Yet, that change is our salvation! Without resurrection, Good Friday would simply be the story of a good man being unjustly killed. Instead, Christians are resurrection people! We live in anticipation of being raised to new life. That promise is ours, not only at some time is the future, it is ours today! Hallelujah!!

The BIG catch is this: we have to let go of the what has been, and be changed — raised up to what is needed to share the gospel in today's world. We cannot be raised to new life <u>AND</u> be the same as we have been. That new reality can seem scary.

Not everyone is a bold adventurer. Despite our misgivings and reluctance, we CAN have confidence because Jesus will lead our steps. "The Corps of Discovery" had a successful journey, in large part, because of the confidence placed in the leadership. We can have even greater confidence, because Jesus will lead us through these changing times to be the church HE needs for us to be. Trusting in Jesus we can have the confidence to reorient our thinking. As Bolsinger puts it, "If you can adapt and adventure, you can thrive. But you must let go, learn as you go, and keep going no matter what."

What does it TRULY mean to be a people of resurrection?

Members and friends of MUMC, are we ready to adventure with Jesus?
