The Interfaith Scholar Weekend in 2019 will be held March 1-3, 2019, with our featured scholar being the Rev. Dr. Thandeka, a Unitarian Universalist Scholar. Her topic will be: "Liberal Faith's Death and Resurrection in 21st Century America".

Since 1998, the Fresno Interfaith Scholar Weekend has brought a renown scholar from one of the represented religious traditions to Fresno for a weekend of lectures and events on topics of interest to interfaith audiences. Each year, Interfaith Scholar Weekend is a remarkable experience in adult religious education, offering not only the opportunity to hear the lectures, but also to engage in dialogue both with the scholars and other participants.

During the weekend participants also gain spiritual enrichment from learning and worshiping together with people from varied faith communities, for example, joining in Friday evening prayers at the Islamic Cultural Center or Torah study at Temple Beth Israel. The Scholar preaches at one or more of the participating Christian churches on Sunday morning, giving the opportunity for participants to experience that congregation's worship as well.

Started by Community United Church of Christ and Temple Beth Israel in 1998, the Fresno Interfaith Scholar Weekend now includes sponsors from a wide variety of religious traditions, including Muslim, Sikh, Lutheran, Episcopal, United Methodist, Catholic, and Unitarian faith communities. Still other faith communities and institutions participate as co-sponsors.

TEAMS AND MINISTRIES



Strategic Planning

Produces 3 goals for MUMC's year in ministry.

The Church Council met on January 13 and 27. A part of their work in these meetings was to contemplate where the congregation is currently and where the congregation believes God would like us to go.

According to the Book of Discipline, "The mission of the United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

Some current realities that were lifted up are:

- our membership has been in a long, slow decline for decades
- the current ministries of MUMC are ALL good, and doing good work for Jesus, and also
- there is much fatigue in doing the ministries we currently have

The three goals agreed upon will take the congregation on a first step toward improving the overall health and vitality of the congregation and its ministries.

1. Revitalize our hospitality ministries for the purpose of growing the congregation by at least one member per year in each of the English Language Ministry and the Hmong Language Ministry.

(Discussion of possible ways this could be done included: having an organized & intentional "Greeters Ministries," revamping or replacing the "blue card," having fellowship time after all worship services, and more.

The wording "growing the congregation by at least one member " is an intentional effort to reverse the trend of decline. The concept of growing needs to account for all those who move away, pass away, or walk away. Growing needs to be the "net" number at the end of the year.

Why did the goal mention "in each the ELM and HLM? Because there have been several years in which the HLM gained several members, while the ELM gained zero members. The goal is intended to acknowledge that growing the congregation by making disciples of Jesus Christ is the work of the entire congregation.)

2. To find the intersection between the congregations' passions and the deep needs of the surrounding community.

(This process will require a little more time, and may even reach out to other congregations in our Circuit, as our "surrounding communities" often overlap.)

3. Before the end of March 2019, every ministry of MUMC will conduct a ministry audit to assess if all aspects of our current ministries are aligned with the mission of the UMC, and to assess if there are some practices that might be adjusted to make the ministries be more closely in alignment with the goals.

(An assessment tool is being developed to help ministries engage in this process. Shout out to our United Methodist Men and our WWD Etc. Ministries for beginning this work already!)

Let us hold these goals in prayer, that God's guidance will lead us all to a place of greater vitality and deeper relevance.

Finance Report


We Did It!

After struggling all year to get out from under the large bills we pay at the beginning of the year, we actually came out in the black at the end of the year.

The General Fund figures turned out like this:

November Balance: -\$2,325
December Income: \$37,005
December Expenses: \$28,101
December Balance: \$6,579
Not only that, but we paid our Con-

Not only that, but we paid our Conference Tithe IN FULL, plus giving \$1,200 toward Second Mile Giving.



In addition to paying our bills, we collected and paid gifts to other causes. Our Thanksgiving offering provided \$3,524 for the Conference Disaster Fund to assist wildfire victims and our Christmas offering gave \$867 to the Thomas Food Project in Haiti. We sent about \$2,500 to the Conference for various causes including Global Migration, Puerto Rico and UMCOR. We gave six goats to Heifer Project and \$729 to Liberia.

Our General Fund budget for 2019 estimates an income of \$253,550 and expenditures of \$254,758. This leaves a deficit of only \$1,208 that we can hope to raise during the year.

The total of our Estimates of Giving for 2019 is \$142,020. Fewer people have pledged than last year, but most plan to give more. The 2018 total was \$149,099 but only \$137,696 of that was actually received. We hope that all of the 2019 estimates will be paid in full.

Most of the rest of the budget is funded by non-pledged contributions, groups who share the use of our buildings, the Thrift Store, grants, and the Boutique.

We are grateful to everyone who helped with our mission and ministries last year and hope for another wonderful year of serving God in our community and the world.

(Friends of United Methodist University of Liberia)

The work of FUMUL is to support the University in all ways possible, which includes such far-reaching programs as helping to bolster the UM education system the trains students for the university and supporting the UM hospital in Ganta that is a training ground for the UMUL nursing program.

We are excited to announce that Pastor Janette will be able to travel to Liberia in March. In the ten days she will spend in the country she will be touring the university and several schools for children and youth. She will have a chance to visit the hospital in Ganta, and take some medical supplies. She will visit deeply rural areas, as well as in the urban capitol of Monrovia. She will have a chance to meet our partners in this ministry, and will be better able to interpret to those of us "state side" the challenges being faced and how our we can best respond.

Pastor Janette will take as much luggage as possible filled with items to leave in Liberia. The Department of Education of the Liberia Annual Conference is recommending that the best donations would be paperback children's books with pictures and other general school supplies (pencils, notebooks, etc.). Any and all donations would be highly appreciated.



Green Team News - Chocolate

If you plan to buy chocolates for Valentine's Day, please consider the following brands:

Alter Eco, Divine, Endangered Species, Equal Exchange, Shaman, and Theo Chocolates.

These companies receive an "A" rating from
Green America for their ethically and sustainably
sourced cacao. If you can't find these, there are
other ethically sourced chocolate companies not
on Green America's list. As a lesser alternative,
Mars and Nestlè have the next highest score on
Green America's list at "C+".

According to the US Department of Labor, more than two million children in West Africa work in hazardous conditions on small cacao farms in West Africa where the families earn less than \$1 per day.

Alter Eco works closely with its co-op farmers, supporting their communities. Divine Chocolate is owned by the farmers who share in the profits and have a voice in the company. Equal Exchange seeks to build long-term partnerships that are economically just and environmentally sound.

Several of the brands listed above can be purchased at Sprouts or online. Trader Joe's, Whole Foods, or other local stores may carry them.

Special Called General Conference

The General Conference of 2016 asked the Bishops of our denomination to lead us to find a way forward in our denomination for our global church to cease struggling with issues around human sexuality.

The Bishops appointed a task force that took 2 years to develop 3 options that seemed to be the best ways for the denomination to move forward. Beginning February 23 a special called General Conference will be held in St. Louis, MO, where over 800 delegates from around the world will gather to address the topic at hand. While there is only one topic for this gathering, it involves 78 pieces of legislation to be considered, and the delegates are required to complete their work by the end of business on February 26.
