
Produce Cart





News From Carol Partridge, Our Missionary in Macedonia - We recently received a delightful letter from Carol Partridge, the United Methodist missionary we support though our Covenant Relationship. She thanked us for our prayers and financial gifts and detailed some of the things she does serving children, youth, and women of several United Methodist congregation in and around Strumica, Macedonia. Carol is a teacher and many of her responsibilities are education-related. Her duties include developing Sunday School lessons and related arts and crafts, training Sunday School teachers and youth group leaders, and helping with Meals on Wheels and other humanitarian outreaches to the elderly and the poor. She has been working on plans for Vacation Bible School to be held in the city and in

several neighboring villages. They were expecting over 200 children, many from the local congregations, but also many neighborhood children who would have their first opportunity to hear the "Good News." She was also planning a camp for children with special needs. Forty-five excited UM youth will be traveling this month to the European Methodist Festival in Slovakia. Carol writes: "Because the UMC in Macedonia is a minority church and the members have known persecution in the past, it will be especially encouraging for the youth to experience a large and enthusiastic Methodist gathering." She asks



her covenant churches to pray for the Macedonian people, many of whom live in extreme poverty and struggle with unemployment or very low wages.

What a blessing it is to be an active partner in Carol's exciting work! How can you support our covenant relationship? You can provide crafts, baked goods, etc. for our Fall Boutique and/or plan to do some of your holiday shopping there. The "Boutique Ladies" have generously agreed to make support of this ministry their focus. Some Thoughts on the Climate Crisis - by Sue DeFranco

The Live Earth concerts on 7/7/07 provided a hopeful scene as I watched people all over the planet brought together by music to raise awareness about the issue of global warming and the climate



crisis. A favorite moment for me was the performance by a band made up of scientists doing climate research in Antarctica. But the day brought to mind a similar event (on a decidedly smaller scale) from my high school days. In an earnest attempt to raise awareness about air pollution, my high school set aside a day when no one drove. Everyone walked or biked to school and the parking lots were empty. . except for Mr. Beck, my sophomore social studies teacher's old, beat-up Corvair. He was, of course, questioned as to why he drove.

His answer to us stuck with me all my life. He said, "You cannot make effective change by investing one day in a problem, no matter how noble the intention. You must be willing to make a lifelong commitment and your thinking must be forever different." Now that it seems like most of us have come to some sort of an agreement that there is a problem to begin with, it remains up to us whether we want to invest just one day or give way to a new paradigm. As a person over 50, I am beginning to think seriously about what legacy I will leave my children and my grandchildren. God made this glorious earth for us with its beauty, diversity, and bountiful resources. He also charged us with a responsibility to care for this gift and with a few life style changes, we can honor God and His creation. Here are some things we can do right here at Memorial so that we can be part of the solution rather than part of the problem. Small steps, in the right direction.


1. <u>Save energy</u>. Turn on lights and air conditioning/heating when needed-turn them off when not. Could we swap some light bulbs for energy-saving

compact fluorescent bulbs? (I just replaced 10 standard bulbs at home with CFB's.) Studies have shown that if each American changed one bulb

to a CFB, we'd save enough energy to light 2.5 million homes a year and we'd drastically cut carbon dioxide emissions, a key contributor to climate.

change. Carpool with a friend to worship or to church events.-enjoy the fellowship while you are saving gas and emissions.

- 2. Recycle, Reuse, Renew. Do you know that we use, on average, 60 or more disposable cups for our Sunday fellowship time. That's over 3,000 cups a year. If even 10 people were willing to bring a reusable cup with their name in permanent ink on it for Coffee Hour, it would make a significant difference. If this of interest to you, let me know and I will make a place in the little kitchen for you to store your cup. I am willing to put it out for for you, wash it, and put it away each Sunday I do the Coffee Hour.
- 3. <u>Buy locally</u>. Shop at the Farmer's Market and at our Produce Cart for your fruits and vegetables. The produce is great and the amount of energy expended to get food from the grower to you is much less.
- 4. <u>Buy Fairly Trade products.</u> Did you know that any grower who produces an item for Equal Exchange, our provider of Fair Trade items for the United Methodist Committee on Relief Coffee project, is required to prove that they use growing practices that are earth-friendly? Most Fair Trade coffee is shade-grown, meaning that trees were not removed to make room for coffee planting. More trees means the earth stays a nicer place for all of us.
