PARISH NURSES - DEFIBRILLATOR PROJECT:

The congregation has responded very positively to the request for funding for the defibrillator - the response was so good - that we were able to purchase two defibrillators - one for each gathering place. How wonderful! We are very grateful! The research has proven that having the little "magic" machine available has saved numerous lives. The installation will probably be complete by the time you read this newsletter. We have opportunity to train 8 people in the use of this equipment - free of charge, however if we have more than 8 people responding we can provide scholarships up to 4 more. We are requesting that 2 regular worshipers from each worship service. There are some of you already trained - that's great, but we want to be sure that we do have representation from each service. The dedication was on November 16, in memory of Doris Tallmadge and Barbara Walsh.

We are thankful for numerous other contributors as well. Looking ahead we are planning another Healthy Heart Potluck late in February - with a special guest Cardiologist speaker. If there are other areas of interest in the health/medical field, please let us know - by leaving a message at the office or contacting Lucy Elgin. MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT

SIERRA VILLA MINISTRY: Our ministry at Sierra Villa Rest Home began about twenty years ago as an outreach of the Fresno Ministry at a meeting attended by Sue DeFrance and I. We were welcomed warmly by the owners, Sue Clinn and Jo Story. Each Friday afternoon we joined 20 ar 25 elderly members for hymn singing, praying, scripture reading and a Bible lesson. When Sue returned to school, Emmett Eller became the group leader, and added gospel hymn tapes played on his boom box before giving the lesson. We were often joined by members of our church as supporters and several pastors and assistant pastors led the group and served communion. On special holidays we did crafts with them and our choir entertained them at Christmas and Easter. It became an all church ministry. Rather than hunt for songs in the hymnal, we selected their favorite hymns and made a songbook of the words for each to use. At various times, Marilyn Baltz, Norma Meek, Janet Bonzo and Sue have played the piano for the group singing. When Emmett passed away, Sue and I were once more the leasers. As a young child Tara became a part of our team, usually playing with the resident Siamese cat or entertaining us with her songs. We watched the facility expand in size and made new friends. About four years ago, Sue and Jo felt it was time to retire and sold the place to an Indian doctor who lives in the Bay Area, and visits during each month. Presently, there are about 30 residents at the home. Last Christmas the UMW wrapped gifts of socks, lotions and toiletries

for each one and a friend of Cecelia Acton's, who was part of our team, spent the afternoon with them as a perfect Santa. At the present time, Judy Gross and I are the ministry team and Pastor Denice joins us the first Friday of the month to bring the message and to serve communion. She has learned many of the hymns they love to sing. George and Lucy Elgin have visited also and brought their German Shepherd to the delight of the patients. The third Friday we have a party to celebrate Birthdays. When Norma Meek came to help with a party she renewed a friendship with a high school classmate, Helen. We were saddened when Helen passed away three weeks ago. On party day Molly Lovgren and Margie Magargee brought a Cosco decorated cake and served the members with a cake and drink treat as their mission. After years of faithful service Molly and Margie needed a change. Dorrie Osback-Rose volunteered to bake cupcakes which we frosted with cool whip. As the age of the residents increased and more Alzheimers friends joined us we decided a cookie treat was easier to serve than cupcakes. On party day Judy brings her Casio and we sing favorite songs along with the hymns. For Halloween their treat was a pumpkin shaped gingerbread cookie and a drink which they enjoyed. The Bible group has decreased to about 12 as we have lost many of our favorite friends. We now gather around tables in a corner of the dining room. Attention spans and communication may be a problem, but they still join us in singing they hymns they learned long ago. The Lord's Prayer is still a part of their worship along with patriotic songs. The ministry there has changed in many ways but we remember Jesus' words in Matthew 18:20, "For where two or three come together in my name, there I am with them." FROM THE PASTOR

COACH'S CORNER: The Imagine! service continues to unfold. Your wonderful support and encouragement are so appreciated! We are looking now toward implementing our next step in letting the larger community know we are hear and meeting their needs. These plans include a first emphasis on attracting families and a part time Family Ministry person. Key to this next step is securing back up musicians and additional music leadership-both of which we are currently working on, in order to sustain the quality of the service. Also, we are working on efforts to involve more of the current Imagine! congregation in participating in worship leadership. In the meantime here is some food for thought which I want to share with you about four major shifts within today's Church. These shifts affect how we share the good news.

There's a shift from :

- 1) The machine to garden metaphor. The church is not a machine but a garden. It is more important to grow people than it is to grow churches. Instead of managing a church, you nurture people.
- 2) Volunteers to servants. Managing volunteers is history. Today the Church must recognize gift-

based servant hood based on a person's God given sense of call, passion and interests.

- Coordinators to mobilizers. Rather than coordinating volunteers, the Church is mobilizing servants around their spiritual DNA. People must be given permission to exercise their gifts and call.
- 4) Control to permission-giving. The days of managing and controlling are gone. Today, the shift is from centralized to cellular, from top-down to bottom-up.

These shifts are helping us to live out our mission of showing and telling Jesus' love everywhere and fulfill our vision of servant empowered lay based leadership based on our shared values and beliefs. When this happens, discipleship happens, which after all is the purpose of the Church: to make disciples for the transformation of the world.

LESLIE'S SALT SHAKER: Shh! I'm going to tell you a secret most of the world around us doesn't know: Christmas begins Christmas Eve at midnight and lasts for twelve days!! It concludes on Epiphany Sunday the day we celebrate the arrival of the Three Wise Men (Jan. 4 this year) and the giving of their gifts to the Christ Child. So if you are feeling pushed, stressed, unprepared and like, "Yikes! Its almost December and (fill in the blank of what you haven't accomplished), RELAX!
