Upcoming Events

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING SUNDAY MARCH 22, 2009: One parishioner said that "Special Sundays are an opportunity for me to walk the talk. My world is small, and by participating in these offerings, I help people who are beyond my limited reach". The General Conference has created six unique Special Sundays to help congregations work with communities and rebuild shattered lives. March 22 is one such Sunday: One Great Hour of Sharing. Necessities of life include food, shelter, and clothing. However, many people around the world lack these basic necessities. The One Great Hour of Sharing offering makes these necessities a reality by sharing the goodness of life with those who hurt. When a catastrophe occurs (like Hurricane Katrina) your offerings to One Great Hour of Sharing enable the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) to reach out and ease the pain and suffering with humanitarian aid of food, shelter, health and peace. It is important to note that unlike other mission programs UMCOR receives no World Service or other apportionment money. This is why your faithful support of the One Great Hour of Sharing offering is crucial. God calls us to be the hands, heart and hope of the church for people who are suffering. Through One Great Hour of Sharing we enable the church to answer that call.

FORTY DAYS ON FOOT: The forty days of Lent have already started, but it's not too late to join in on the forty-day Lenten jog-a-thon, walk-a-thon or bike-a-thon — anything powered by your own feet, including treadmills and stationary bikes. In the spirit of the CROP Walk, let's see how much money we can raise for our Ethnic Minority apportionment by collecting pledges for how far we can travel over forty days. Participants will move their feet at their own time over the forty days — a mile a day — five miles in a weekend — whatever fits into their schedule. Getting a group together to move out in force would work, too. Anyone who is interested in participating can contact

Diane Zastovnik, the church office, or pick up a pledge form and mileage log in the Narthex. Anyone interested in pledging can sign up with any of the participants, or on the pledge sheet in the Narthex. Participants will not only get the benefit of helping to raise some of the \$2,101 we need for our share of the conference's Ethnic Minority Fund (which helps fund our Hmong ministry) but they will also get forty days of exercise to benefit their health.

SCRIPTURE PASSAGES FOR LENT

The scriptures assigned for the Sundays of Lent are listed here. You are encouraged to read through them, list your questions and open your bibles during the sermon to follow along as we delve into God's word for us this season.

Transfiguration: 2 Kings 2: 1 - 12, Psalm 50: 1 - 6, 2 Corinthians 4: 3 - 6 and Mark 9: 2-9. [We will observe Transfiguration on the First Sunday in Lent this year.]

First Sunday in Lent: Genesis 9: 8 – 7, Psalm 25: 1 – 10, 1 Peter 3: 18 – 22 and Mark 1: 9 -15. [These scriptures will not be preached this year. See pastors article for a reflection on the gospel passage.].

Second Sunday in Lent: Genesis 17: 1 – 7, 15 -16, Psalm 22:23 – 31, Romans 4: 13 – 25 and Mark 8: 31 – 38.

Third Sunday in Lent: Exodus 20: 1 - 17, Psalm 19, 1 Corinthians 1:18-25 and John 2:13-22

Fourth Sunday in Lent: Numbers 21: s4 – 9, Psalm 107:1-3, 17 – 22, Ephesians 2: 1 – 10 and John 3: 14-21.

Fifth Sunday in Lent: Jeremiah 31: 31-34, Psalm 51: 1 -12, Hebrews 5: 5-10 and John 12: 20-33.

Mark is the gospel focus this year for Palm/Passion Sunday and for Easter Sunday. You are invited to read through Mark through Lent for your spiritual growth.

DINNERS FOR EIGHT: This is a social group started in the church some years back. So long ago, in fact, that I can't remember exactly when. At least three of us have headed it. GRIEF RECOVERY: One of the loneliest feelings we can experience is when our loved one is no longer with us. The purpose of the Grief Recovery Team is to help the grieving person through several phases of recovery. These phases will not necessarily follow the same course for each person, nor do they have a set time period which they follow. There are many causes of grief besides a loss of life; we can grieve due to a change of life stage, a move due to position change or transfer, loss of home or property, disability, or other major life event. We may be in a state of shock from a tragic experience leaving us numb for a while as a temporary escape from reality. This may be followed by a show of emotion. Let it out. There is a stage of depression or loneliness, or even blaming someone for your grief - yes, even yourself. Panic may also grab hold of the grieving person. There may be other difficult stages for a grieving person, but do not despair! We listen and talk with you at anytime in fullest confidence. Please call John or Gil. With God's help we have been in touch with sixteen families in the short time we have been on call.

FROM THE PASTOR

LESLIE'S SALT SHAKER: The gospel passage for the First Sunday in Lent is Mark 19 - 15. This is the account of Jesus being baptized by John in the River Jordan and how the God proclaims him, "You are my Son, the Beloved, with you I am well pleased." Traditionally during Lent, those new to the faith prepare for baptism. Baptism is God's welcome, God's embracing grace and affirmation that we are God's beloved with whom he is well pleased. We don't always get that message during Lent because the focus is on the costs of discipleship. Those who follow Jesus and are loyal to God's way run into the not-so-loving ways of the world. Our own limitations too often contribute to the hurt, pain and injustice of life. This is when we look to Jesus and see that he was willing to be God's embrace for the whole world even if it meant dying on a cross. We see his example and realize that discipleship can be costly for all who follow depending on the circumstance we find ourselves in. We are called to take up our cross and follow after him-that is: to be loving and just even if it means putting ourselves in harms way in order to be loyal to God's way. That is something we unconsciously dismiss and so we walk on by the cross without another glance in its direction. The rest of the scripture passage invites us to struggle with what it means to follow faithfully. It says after his baptism the Spirit immediately drove Jesus out into the wilderness where he was tempted for forty days and forty nights. Lent is a period of 40 days set aside to help us examine ourselves, our relationship with God, with others and with the larger world. Jesus knows our struggle because he is human just like we are. He was tempted, he was afraid, especially after his cousin John the Baptist was arrested and killed, but he chose to place his life in God's hands and continue his ministry of proclaiming the Good News of God's grace for all. It's a day by day decision we make. Staying close to Jesus through daily scripture reading and prayer is the best way to walk with him through the daily circumstances that call us to choose the his way or the world's way. It's a journey. May the journey of living the Good News daily be our home. Pastor Denice Leslie
