I have all of the get well cards, and also all of the Sympathy cards. They remind me of your love and prayers. The memorial was very special. Dona Leonardo, Wayne, Asima, Carolyn Gentry, the organist, Pastor Denice, and all who participated did an outstanding and beautiful job. Jim was watching from heaven, and I know he thanks you also. The meal prepared by the UMC Kitchen Crew was a wonderful one. There was such a variety of dishes, and I know that to work so hard, and on such a hot Fresno day was done in love for Jim and our family. Thanks for the food preparation, and for the long hours you worked. I love you and appreciate all your time and effort. I miss being with you, my church family. I want to come to service, but still feel lost and am not sure if I could make it yet. Time will give me more strength to handle where I am now, and where I need to be.
