SERVICES IN HOLY WEEK

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on April 17th. This will be a joint service of the Imagine and traditional services, starting at 10:30 a.m., led by the youth group. They are working hard throughout March and April to have the service be an inspirational experience for all who gather that morning.

- Maundy Thursday will be an exploration of the Passover meal, Jesus' last meal with the disciples. The meal is a celebration of liberation. As we gather at 7 p.m. in the fellowship hall, if possible, please bring with you a small object that represents some way in which during this past year you have experienced God's liberating power. (If you would like to do so, be prepared to share briefly about the experience with those gathered.) We will have Holy Communion and transition into the passion and redeeming work of Good Friday.
- Good Friday service will be held at Academy church at 7 p.m. This will be a tenebrae service, in which
 the scriptures will be read and candles extinguished as we move towards the crucifixion, death and burial
 of Jesus.
- Easter Sunrise Service will again be at academy at 7 a.m. We will gather to celebrate our risen Lord in the beautiful country setting.
- Easter services at MUMC will be at the usual times 9:30 Imagine and 11 traditional. We will have a special "eye witness" account of the resurrection at both services.
- BYOBasket egg hunt will happen between the worship services on Easter Sunday. See the related articles elsewhere in this newsletter for full details.
- Easter afternoon will have a potluck at Academy church at 12:30 p.m., with a worship service at 2:30 p.m. Again, the "eye witness" will be on hand to tell the story of the resurrection to the congregation gathered.
 All of these services will be times that are very appropriate to invite family and friends to attend! Start making your plans now to be present and prayerfully inviting others to join you.

p.m.. EVERONE is invited to join the fun evening together. There is no charge for this event.



More important is the personal satisfaction we get from successfully creating an Order of Worship that enhances the worship experience for the congregation. That is, after all, the primary purpose of the planning. It's a ministry that can only be appreciated by participating in it. I would invite anyone in the congregation to attend one of these planning sessions to observe, first hand, the dedication of those who have accepted this as their ministry.



FAIR TRADE: A TASTE OF JUSTICE

Coffee and fellowship come together where we share community. A warm pot of coffee is

share community. A warm pot of coffee is often the centerpiece of fellowship gatherings. As one of the most heavily traded commodities in the world, coffee is a direct link between our community and farming communities in Latin America, Africa and Asia. Yet the small farmers who grow our coffee often struggle just to make a simple living. Most live in rural communities in some of the poorest countries of the world. Isolated from markets, they are forced to accept low prices and may be paid an amount for the beans they toil so hard to grow that is less than the cost of produc-



We are called by God to respond where there is injustice and there is a way we can do this and still enjoy our morning cup of coffee. By buying Fair Trade coffee, tea, and chocolate, you are purchasing quality products that have met certain criteria. For a coffee, tea or chocolate importer to become Fair Trade certified, they must agree to pay a fair minimum wage to the grower for beans or leaves, help to provide healthy and safe working conditions for laborers, assure that child labor laws are not being abused, support environmentally sustainable practices, etc. By purchasing Fair Trader Certified products, we show our support for an equitable partnership between marketers in North America and growers in Latin America, Asia, Africa, and the Caribbean. We can help farmers build better lives for themselves and their families.

There has been a renewed interest in having Fairly Traded items available for purchase at the church like we have had in the past and you will be hearing more about this when they arrive from the Equal Exchange United Methodist Committee on Relief Coffee Project. CHOCOLATE BUNNIES OR JESUS CHRIST?

At Easter, are we celebrating the risen Christ, Jesus' triumph over the tomb, or is the Easter bunny at the center of our festivities? If we focus on the former, maybe it will impact how we indulge in the latter. We all know chocolates don't come from rabbits. But how aware are we of where they do come from? Too often it is the slave labor of children. Major chocolate companies agreed in 2001 that within four years they would not purchase cocoa products from

growers who used child labor. Deadlines came and went but most practices didn't change. Sadly, Hershey has not agreed to any third party certification on the working conditions of its growers. Nestle has minimal protection for workers (UTZ certified). Mars and Kraft are slightly better with their Rainforest Alliance certification (30% of ingredients comply). Equal Exchange and Theo Chocolate are IMO Fair for Life certified (at least 50% compliance). Several smaller companies are Fair-Trade certified (100% of primary ingredients comply). Whole Foods carries Alter Eco, Divine, Green & Black and Theo. Green & Black is also available at most locations of Savemart,

CVS, Walgreens and Target. -- The Green Team

A MINISTRY OF THE FULL CONGREGATON: Outreach to the Hmong Community through Funeral Ministry.

Conversations and plans are moving forward for a joint ministry venture with Grace UMC in Fresno to provide an outreach ministry to the Hmong community through providing a beautiful and reasonably priced space in which to host their funerals, which last several days. The plans would involve the use of the buildings at Grace UMC to use for the weekend-long events. If our plans proceed as hoped, we may be able to begin using the facilities starting in the coming month. There is work to be done – both mental and physical! The AST and Network ministries have all affirmed that this is a ministry of our entire congregation, and all members of MUMC are encouraged to be involved in some way.



Please join us at Grace UMC (Fourth & Balch in Fresno) for a time of cleaning and preparation on Saturday, March 26, between the hours of 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. We will be reorganizing, moving furniture and cleaning the spaces we will need to use in order to be ready to host a funeral service. This will be a good opportunity to work together across languages and cultures as we build the body of Christ within our congregation

and by reaching out to the community.

A MESSAGE FROM HOSPITALITY:

If the items are left for more than 2 weeks, they will be thrown in the trash.

SAVE MART SHARES CARDS: The church received a check for \$401.24 for the Oct/Nov/Dec quarter from the SaveMart SHARES program. This is an extremely easy way to raise funds for the church. The most we have received in one quarter so far is \$404. Let's see if we can beat that next time!

PARSONAGE MEETING MARCH 6 FOLLOWUP

The congregation gathered on March 6 to hear a report on the merits and concerns in a proposed plan to purchase a parsonage for MUMC. There was a nice presentation of the findings of the study which had been appointed by the Administrative Support Team (AST). Their conclusion was that this is a good time to purchase; it is a good investment and can also be less expensive than a housing allowance for the pastor. There was much support of the proposal, discussion of funding options, and also the recommendation that the Trustees have a policy in place for sufficient funding for upkeep and maintenance of the house.

The congregation voted that the Trustees move ahead with the plans to find and purchase a house to be used as a parsonage. When such a house is identified, a charge conference will be called to approve the purchase.

Also, the congregation voted to enter into a period of 60 days in which to raise funds for the down payment. An anonymous gift of matching funds up to \$35,000 will be made for NEW CASH IN HAND donated to the fund before May 5. Special Parsonage donation envelopes will be



available in the pews on Sunday mornings.

A NEAT COMMUNITY SERVICE: The local 14th District of the American Legion has a wonderful way of serving the community – they care for the graves of fallen service members who have no family locally to care for them. Once a year, they place remembrances on the graves, and they make sure that they are clean and in good order. What a great service to the families that cannot be there to care for their loved ones themselves! If you are interested in becoming a part of this service, they have opportunities for community members who are connected with businesses to place ads in their newsletter. FROM THE PASTOR

What is your favorite holiday or celebration? Why? Are there certain traditions for that celebration that are especially meaningful? Any special rituals associated with the celebration?

As Methodists, we tend to appreciate rituals.Our celebrations have many traditions incorporated in them. We like the "method" of ritual, routine and traditions.

Some of us find great meaning in rituals and traditions that can be traced back hundreds, even a thousand years. We may find special depth in knowing that while so much of our world seems in constant flux, our religious faith has a strong and solid foundation that grounds us to the transcendent God – who was and is and will be forever more.

For some of us the length or exact practice of a tradition is not as important as participating is something that touches us deeply. The traditions we love may be only a few years or decades old, but they speak to the very core of our being, connecting us with the one who created the universe and called it good!

We need to be careful, however, that we keep God at the center of all of our practices. Whether new or old, the practice and performance of a tradition or ritual must NEVER be the focus. The point of all our traditions and rituals are to help us grow closer to the One who loves us more than we can ever fully understand. Any traditions or

rituals which do not help with that goal have ceased to serve their purpose.

Jesus teaches us that the laws, commandments, rituals of our faith are there to help us connect with God; the practice of them is not in and of itself the goal. When challenged as to why he would pluck some grain and eat it on the Sabbath Jesus replies "The Sabbath is made for man, not man for the Sabbath." Even though the observance of Sabbath is a commandment, Jesus' response reminds us that rigidity of practice does not make us holy. The practices are one way to connect us more fully to God, a means of grace.

We are now in the season of Lent. There are many rituals and traditions associated with the observance of our Lord's resurrection, with the days leading to his passion and crucifixion, and the days that follow Easter. Many of us have accepted special disciplines or practices for this season of preparation to accept in a deeper, transformational way the truth of new life in Christ. Some are spending more time in prayer, some have ceased to eat certain foods, and others are exercising more. Some are doing works of kindness in the community. All are seeking to use the time and these disciplines to strip away anything that would stand between our soul and our savior.

I encourage everyone to take time to observe Lent – to prepare yourself to be overwhelmed by the intensity of God's love for you. This is a great tradition of the church, and is a method that helps us each year to get more and more fully in touch with the grace of God which is the source of our salvation. -js
